Class 3 Revision Guide for Classics

Length of examination: 1 hour

Revision topics:

Nouns: nominative and accusative singular; nominative plural.

Verbs: porto and sum, present tense, I, you, he/she/it/we/you (plural), they; imperfect and perfect tense, he and they.

Vocabulary: checklists for stages 1 - 6

All required information is in the Class 3 Revision Guide 2019

EXAMINATION FORMAT

Girls will be asked to:

- Fill in a noun chart
- Fill in a verb chart
- Fill in a vocabulary chart, giving the English meanings for words in the checklists for Stages 1-6
- Complete exercises with selection of correct grammatical forms of words/vocabulary
- Translate sentences from Latin into English
- Translate a passage from Latin into English

Class 3 Revision Guide for English

The exam is an hour and a half long. There will be a passage to read and questions to answer, some of which will be on the content of the passage (comprehension), and some of which will ask you to look at the language used in the passage.

There will also be a short Directed Writing task: you will have to select information from the passage and use it to write a continuation of the story with dialogue.

Useful to remember:

- Basic parts of speech (nouns, adjectives, verbs and adverbs).
- How to write about figurative language (similes, metaphors and the effect they have on the reader).
- How to do Directed Writing
- How to punctuate speech and use paragraphs.

Revision:

The exam is based on skills you have been practising throughout the year. It is helpful to have a good vocabulary and to keep reading!

Class 3 Revision Guide for French

There will be four sections: **listening, speaking, reading and writing (including grammar)**. Each will be worth 25%. The listening (Monday 3rd June) will be approximately 30 minutes and the reading, writing and grammar one hour. For the oral test (21st or 24th May) you will prepare questions about yourself which you will be given in advance.

- On the final page there will be an extended question which you will be expected to answer in paragraphs.

Class 3 Revision Guide for Mathematics

This year's Summer Examination will consist of:

- 1 non-calculator paper (40 minutes + extra time)
- 1 calculator paper (40 minutes + extra time)

Students will be required to bring in their own equipment for both tests. This includes a calculator, a protractor, compasses and a 30 cm ruler, as well as general writing equipment.

Number

- Fractions – Adding, subtracting, multiplying, dividing, and converting to proper and improper fractions.
- FDP – Converting Fraction, decimals and percentages.
- Percentages – Percentage of and percentage increase/decrease
- Negative numbers
- BIDMAS – order of operations
- Rounding (decimal places)
- Ratios

Algebra

- Sequences – Generating terms in a sequence and finding the nth term.
- Collecting like terms
- Expanding brackets and simplifying algebraic expressions
- Solving equations with x on one side
- Solving equations with x's on both sides
- Substitution into formulas and expressions.

Shapes

- Area and Perimeter – Rectangles, triangles and compound shapes.
- Circles – area and circumference of Circles, semicircles and quarter-circles
- Volume of objects
- Geometrical reasoning – Angles in basic shapes, angles in parallel lines.
- Reflection of shapes
- Enlargement – Enlarging a shape by a scale factor (no centre of enlargement)
- Constructions - Bisecting a line, bisecting an angle and constructing equilateral and scalene triangles.

Statistics

- Averages – Finding the mean, mode, median and range from a small data set.
- Probability – Introduction to and Probability of an event occurring.

All students will be given blank copies of the chapter tests they have been doing throughout the year for revision purposes.

Class 3 Revision Guide for Music

Everything you need to know for your examination can be found in your workbooks for this academic year!

- The questions in the **examination** will test your understanding of musical vocabulary, the musical elements, styles and historical context. For example:

- For the examination, you should know these **Italian musical terms**:

You should also learn any specific musical vocabulary related to the topics we have covered. You will find these words in your booklets, which, nearer the time, you will be able to take home to revise from. This year's topics have been:

- Showstoppers! Singing Project
- Instruments of the Orchestra
- Medieval Music
- Fanfares
- Music theory (the basics of treble clef pitches and note lengths we have learned)

You will complete an examination paper lasting approximately **thirty minutes**. The paper will mostly contain multiple-choice questions, which are designed to assess your understanding of musical terminology, vocabulary and techniques.

Class 3 Revision Guide for Religious Studies

The examination will last 60 minutes.

You must answer all questions *in full sentences*.

There will be three sections:

- Judaism – beliefs: the covenant relationship; reminders of beliefs in daily Jewish life (clothes, moral rules, mezuzah, food laws); Jewish festivals.
- Christianity – beliefs: the Trinity, incarnation and resurrection; Jesus’ moral teaching in the Sermon on the Mount; the celebration of Lent and Easter.
- Rites of Passage – baptism; bar and bat mitzvah.
- Essay titles - you will be asked to write one ‘argument essay’.

You will be given a topic list with textbook page references and a set of revision questions. Use these to take bullet point revision notes. Memorise the notes. Get somebody to test you.

You can find all the information you need in your exercise book and on Firefly. (If there is a topic for which you have no information in your exercise book, contact your teacher. You may have to go back to the textbook and Firefly to catch up.)

Class 3 Revision Guide for Science

- Length of exam: 1.5 hours. The marks for each question are clearly shown. There are three sections covering Biology, Chemistry and Physics.
- Revision topics:

Biology: Life processes; using a microscope; cells and cell specialisation; levels of organisation; diffusion; osmosis; organ systems; classification, ecology; evolution.

Chemistry: Atoms, elements, molecules, compounds and mixtures and pure substances; the Periodic Table; the particle model of solids, liquids and gases; filtration; distillation; chromatography; physical and chemical changes.

Physics: Static electricity; Circuits and circuit symbols; current, voltage and resistance; magnets and magnetic fields; electromagnetism; forces; resultant forces and their effect on motion; mass; weight.

The textbooks for revision are the 'Longman Biology, Chemistry and Physics' books.
